## Spelling and Grammar Home Learning — 25.03.17

This week we have continued to practise using adverbs in our writing to add detail to our sentences. We have been learning some of the rules for adding the —ly suffix to an adjective to change it to an adverb.

## Rules

- When we want to transform an adjective that ends in the —ful suffix to an adverb, we simply add —ly nothing changes in the adjective. This means the double I pattern in these adjectives for example careful becomes carefully.
- When an adjective ends in a y, we need to change the y to an i before adding
   —ly to make an adverb for example dainty becomes daintily.

Choose a character, a verb and an adjective. Use these to create a sentence, changing the adjective into an adverb to describe how the character is doing the action. Add an object if necessary. Try moving the adverb to a different position until you come up with the most effective sentence and then write it down. For example: Carefully, Jack crept into the mysterious cave. The football player kicked the ball powerfully into the goal. The dangerous beast speedily chased the terrified children around the playground.
