Spellings- suffix rules:

<p>Rule 1</p> <p>When a word ends in a short vowel sound and a single consonant... <b>double the consonant</b></p> <p>shop — shopped</p>	<p>Rule 2</p> <p>When a word ends in a silent e, <b>drop the e...</b> if the suffix begins with a vowel</p> <p>drive — driving hope — hoping</p>	<p>Rule 3</p> <p>When a word ends in a silent e, <b>keep the e...</b> if the suffix begins with a consonant</p> <p>hope — hopeful</p>
<p>Rule 4</p> <p>When a word ends in <b>ee or ge</b>, <b>keep the e</b> if the suffix begins with a or o</p> <p>notice — noticeable advantage — advantageous</p>	<p>Rule 5</p> <p>When a word ends in <b>y</b> <b>change it to i</b> except when the suffix is <b>ing</b></p> <p>baby — babies cry — crying</p>	<p>Rule 6</p> <p>When a word ends in a vowel before the <b>y...</b> <b>keep the y</b></p> <p>boy — boys enjoy — enjoyment</p>

Words to learn:

begin -- beginning	notice -- noticeable
hope -- hoping	country -- countries
use -- useless	lucky -- luckily
hope -- hopeful	copy -- copying
like -- likely	enjoy -- enjoyment
