P.E. and Sports Premium Spending at Darell Primary and Nursery.

The Sports Premium bursary was first introduced by the British Government in March 2013 in an attempt to build upon the fine successes of Team GB at the 2012 London Olympics. The scheme's intention has been to improve the provision of P.E. and sports within school settings. To facilitate this change each school, with 17 or more pupils in the UK is allocated £16,000* plus an extra £10 per pupil thereafter. Such capital is ring-fenced purely for the development and delivery of the provision of P.E.

Darell Primary and Nursery's 2019-2020 allocation of Sports Premium Funding equated to £21,500 and the total amount spent was £33,425.29.

Our 2020-2021 allocation of Sports Premium Funding totalled £18,100 In this document, we will provide the relevant information on this year's P.E. and Sports Premium budget. Furthermore, the document will showcase how we, Darell Primary, aim to improve our offer to our pupils by making PE sporting opportunities and extra-curricular activities fun, engaging, competitive, wide-ranging and inclusive to all.

As a result of the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak, the Department for Education took steps to relax the ring-fencing arrangements for the PE and sport premium in the 2020 to 2021 academic year to allow any unspent grant to be carried forward into the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

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On 17 June 2021 the Education Secretary announced a further relaxation of ring-fencing arrangements for the PE and sport premium. This will allow any unspent grant to be carried forward into the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

Any under-spends carried forward from the 2019 to 2020 academic year, and the 2020 to 2021 academic year, will need to be spent in full by 31 July 2022. Schools should factor this into PE and sport premium spending plans.

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
